And I'm delighted to be welcoming friends to come up and share in the readings as we go through the service together. And then towards the end of the service, there'll just be a short sermon.

This will be the one and only time you'll get a short sermon from Thomas Davis. So you can look forward to that. I'll have to stick to my word. And we'll look to wrap up about seven o'clock.

[1:03] And then afterwards we'll have tea and coffee served both at the hatch and at the station at the front here. And we'd love to be able to share a time of fellowship together afterwards. So please do stick around. It's a great opportunity to catch up with people you haven't seen for a long time.

And a great opportunity to meet new people as well. So a very, very warm welcome to you all in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. We're going to begin and we will prepare our hearts for worship with the words of Isaiah chapter nine verse six.

And as we sing these words, we are continuing on many, many generations before us have sung these words. Many people around the world continue to sing them today and they're all expressing the joy and hope that we have through the birth and work of Jesus.

We come together tonight with joy because of your Son, our Lord Jesus, who was born in such humble circumstances and who experienced so much opposition, who suffered so much and yet now is risen at your right hand.

Andy's going to read to us the next section of Luke's Gospel continuing on from where Mari finished reading from verse 8. So delighted to welcome you Andy, thank you.

Thank you so much Evie. We're going to sing a Gaelic Psalm now and the Psalm is Psalm 107 and we're going to sing verses 28 to 30.

And so you can see that these two verses that we're going to sing are speaking about being caught in a storm. And the verses that we sing, that we're going to sing in particular are speaking about God calming that storm.

It's the picture of sailors in trouble, in fear of their lives crying out to God and being helped by Him. Now if anyone's unfamiliar with Gaelic Psalm singing, it's a little bit different from singing in English but it's very straightforward.

We sing the first two lines together so in a moment Dole will lead us and he'll sing those first two lines. Gle, let, Ri, Ji, En, Cain, Is, Heure, let, On, Trip, Plach, Geher. They cried to God in trouble, He freed them. And so we'll sing those two lines together.

And then from the third line, verse Mark 29 there, Grat, Chirid, Lish, En, Stir, Im, Geher, Dole will sing that line on his own. And then we will sing it back to him. And from that point on we follow the pattern of Dole putting the line out and as a congregation we sing the line back to him as we worship God together.

[32:30] So it's all very straightforward. We'll sing two stands as together. We remain seated for singing in Gaelic, singing these beautiful words about God bringing calm to a storm.
